Present Perfect

The present perfect is made up of the verb *have* and a past participle. Use the present perfect to refer to an indefinite time in the past. In contrast, use the simple past tense to indicate a specific time in the past.

Present Perfect	Simple Past
l' ve been to Canada.	l was in Canada last year.
l' ve visited Canada.	l visited Canada last year.

For regular verbs, the past participle ends in *-ed*. Here are some irregular past participle forms. be-**been**, come-**come**, do-**done**, eat-**eaten**, have-**had**, hear-**heard**, go-**gone**, meet-**met**, ride-**ridden**, see-**seen**, swim-**swum**, take-**taken**, wear-**worn**

Adverb: ever

Ever means "at any time." It is often used in questions in the present perfect.

A: Have you ever been to Canada?

B: Yes, I have. / No, I haven't; No, never; I've never been to Canada.



Under the Stars in the Sahara
